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Executive Summary

District Strategic Plan 2025

Orange County Public Schools is the eighth-largest school district in the United States and the fourth largest in Florida. The district serves more than 206,000 students at 202 schools and is one of the largest employers in Central Florida with more than 25,000 team members.

Vision: To ensure every student has a promising and successful future.

Mission: With the support of families and the community, we create enriching and diverse pathways to lead our students to success.

School Collection Development Plan

Hunter's Creek MS serves 1,117 students enrolled in grades sixth through eighth. The student population's ethnicity is made up of 68% Hispanic and 32% Non-Hispanic students. Additionally, we serve a diverse population made up of 81% White, 8% Black, 7% Asian, 1% Pacific, and 2% Multicultural students

The administration includes Principal Journana Moukaddam, Assistant Principal of Instruction Jane Mabra, and Assistant Principal Debra Vereen. Hunter's Creek MS is proud to offer the many special programs which provide students with opportunities. These include a two-way dual language program; a thriving arts program; Latinos in Action; Advanced Academics; high school level math, science, and Spanish classes; Eagle Eye News; and extracurriculars including Future Problem Solvers, Chess Club, Student Government Association, National Junior Honor Society, Kindness Club, Battle of the Books, Gender & Sexuality Alliance, & athletic teams including soccer, basketball, volleyball, & track.

A thorough analysis of the current media center collection at Hunter's Creek MS indicates that the average age of the collection is 2014 and the number of books per student is 7. The <u>American Association for School Libraries</u> has established a criteria for highly effective media centers that includes a ratio of 15-20 books available per student in the collection. At this time, Hunter's Creek MS does not meet the recommended standards for the number of books per student. In addition to the physical media center collection, the district provides almost 5,000 eBooks, audiobooks and digital magazines.

The analysis of the collection also revealed the following areas of strengths and concerns:

- HCMS's average age is newer than OCPS average age (2008).
- Hispanic/Latinx students are 68% of the school's population; however, only 3% of our collection represents this identity.
- Many of our students read in their native language as well as emerging second language readers. This is a need in our collection because currently only 3.5% of our collection is books in world languages.

In 2023, the state transitioned from Florida Standards Assessments (FSA) to Florida Assessment of Student Thinking (FAST) for English Language Arts (ELA) and Mathematics. - The average age of computer science, information, & general works; philosophy &
 psychology; religion; social sciences; language; technology; literature; and biographies are
 older than the average age of the collection and should be analyzed and needs to be
 improved.
 - Some aged titles are being kept because the content has not changed over time;
 however, circulation of these titles should be analyzed.
 - Note: With the increase in accessibility of nonfiction information on the internet and our access to Gale Research, updating nonfiction is not as critical, so I plan on doing further research on what nonfiction texts would most benefit the curriculum at our school, what nonfiction ages the best, as well as what nonfiction students would pick up to read as nonfiction currently is not very popular among our readers.

Data Reflection

- Our items per student went up by 1/student.
- Our average age of collection went up by 2 years.
- Our representative titles went up 1%.
